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Visiting Special Attractions the week of ALCon 2010

Plan to arrive a few days before ALCon 2010 begins to visit the special attractions in the Tucson area. The dates for the convention are June 25-26. A must see is the Arizona Sonora Desert Museum. The drive up the Catalina Highway is spectacular. From the desert floor at about 3,000 feet, the paved road winds up to over 9,000 feet, and it passes near observatories.

Other special attractions include Kitt Peak National Observatory, the Catalina Highway, Old Tucson, Pima Air and Space, and places like Tombstone and Bisbee. There are also many places to visit for birders, like Madera Canyon, with rare species of birds only seen in southern Arizona. If a sufficient number of people would like to visit Kitt Peak on Monday, June 21, a special ALCon group tour can be arranged. The unprecedented success of 100 Hours of Astronomy in April 2009 demonstrated the power of international collaboration to astronomers around the world, creating even greater enthusiasm for a follow-up experience. There will be online interaction between participants as well, in keeping with GAM's slogan, "One people, one sky."
