



Highlights include:

- **Gottlieb Planetarium** at Union Station in downtown Kansas City, Mo., will provide us a private presentation in their facility.
- **Linda Hall Library**, a world-famous science and technology research library, will feature guest speaker David Levy and a chance to visit the library's rare book room, featuring such books as two of the few extant copies of Galileo's *Siderius Nuncius* (1610).
- **Powell Observatory** for a presentation by ASKC member and astronomy student Rachel Cionitti and an evening of stargazing with the 30-inch Ruisinger Telescope (weather permitting). The observatory visit will be preceded by a stop at the beautiful **Overland Park Arboretum** for a Star-B-Que dinner featuring Kansas City-style BBQ.
- **Banquet and Awards** ceremony featuring a local jazz band, and Brown University professor of physics and astronomy and jazz musician **Stephon Alexander** will discuss his latest book, *The Jazz of Physics*.

Dr. Stephon Alexander, is a musician and professor of physics and astronomy at Brown University (Providence, RI), and author of *The Jazz of* Physics: The Secret Link between Music and the Structure of the Universe. As a theoretical physicist, jazz saxophonist, and author, Alexander specializes in the connections between cosmology, particle physics, and quantum gravity, exploring interconnections between music, physics, mathematics and technology.




Dr. Keivan Stassun holds the Stevenson chair in Physics and Astronomy at Vanderbilt University (Nashville, TN). A passionate leader and advocate for broadening participation in STEM, especially of underrepresented minorities and persons with disabilities, he currently serves as founding director of the Frist Center for Autism and Innovation in Vanderbilt's School of Engineering. In January 2022, Dr. Stassun was appointed by President Joe Biden to serve on the National Science Board.




Dr. David Levy is an Emmy Award winning amateur astronomer, science writer, and discoverer of comets and minor planets, who codiscovered Comet Shoemaker-Levy 9 in 1993. Awarded a PhD from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Levy has written 34 books including *The Quest* for Comets, as well as a poignant biography of Pluto-discoverer Clyde Tombaugh.

Mr. Tim Russ is best known for his role as Lieutenant Commander Tuvok in the TV series Star Trek: Voyager. Russ has been working as an actor, director, and musician for the past thirty-five years.
