



2025 Hidden Hollow Star Party



CELEBRATING TOGETHER UNDER THE STARS FOR 75 YEARS AND COUNTING

The Astronomical League had early roots back to the 1939 Cushing, New York World's Fair, and was officially formalized after the second World War on August 30, 1947. The Mid-States Region formed in 1949 and became official in 1950 and ioined the League in 1951.

Some of the names and faces have changed, but the goal is still the same: to come together and share ideas, resources, and encouragement in this hobby of astronomy. Currently, the

Mid-States Region contains many members who joined as a young adult and have recounted their Central Missouri Amateur Astronomers - Kansas City, Missouri great enduring relationships that they still enjoy today.

This year's 75th Anniversary was held at the University of AR at Little Rock, AR on June 13 to 15th, 2025, and was hosted by Central Arkansas Astronomical Society. This is the first convention in 22 years where there was a full complement of officers and convention chair working together, exactly how the region was established as reported in Sky & *Telescope* articles and convention archive minutes.

The major hurdle facing the convention process is the ever-increasing online meetings culture vs hosting in-person meetings and conventions. Although there is a place for that, MSRAL officers still value the coming together like a family reunion every June. In fact, the officers have decided to engage the regional youth with the mission to have them meet each other, present talks and participate in STEAM activities upcoming conventions. The best part is, a new officer position, Regional

Youth Coordinator, will be in charge of a team of youth who will plan their convention.

One thing we know for sure is that according to Archives on Youth Activities, the Astronomical League had a successful model back at its inception in 1947, where a student league of youth astronomy clubs were connected nationally through a snail mail newsletter, and prepared talks/presentations, observing programs, and attendance at the ALCons. Through this Youth Committee, and its guidance from a coordinator, MSRAL officers will feel confident that there will be good stewards at the ready for the future.

FOUNDING CLUBS RECOGNITION

The second group of awards were the Legacy Clubs and also went to two clubs. Both immediately started to host a regional meeting very early in the 1950s. The first club that is also a major backbone to this region partnered with the Amateur Astronomical Society of Emerson Electric at their Auditorium and Observatory in September, with the Saint Louis Astronomical Society. So far, SLAS has hosted the most conventions.

The other club was the Tulsa Astronomy Club (aka Astronomy Club of Tulsa-ACT). Since no members were present, award and certificate will be delivered when they start up their meetings again in August.

ACT hosted the 5th convention in 1953 with the Wichita Astronomical Society at Grand Lake of the Cherokees, at Grand Lake in Oklahoma. These two clubs would continue to partner for 8 conventions. The early version of Amateur of

the Year Award started at this convention.

The Astronomical Society of NW Arkansas hosted their first convention in 1982, which was held at the Jones Center for Families in Springdale, AR.

President Elliot Neel accepted his club's award. Additionally, he was a presenter at the convention with a talk called, "Homage to the Porter Garden Telescope" that was built in the 1920s by Russell Porter, artist, engineer, architect, cartographer, amateur astronomer and Arctic explorer and founder of Stellafane held annually in Springfield, VT.

The next hosting club was the Prairie Astronomical Society in Nebraska, who hosted their first convention in 1970, which was held at the Wesleyan University, Lincoln, NE. They would also partner with OAS for another events. Fellow Nebraskan, Mike Modrcin from the Omaha Astronomical Society received it on their behalf.



Last but not least is the Sugar Creek Astronomical Society which hosted in 2018 at Explore Scientific in Springdale, AR. It was at this meeting that MSRAL had a Horkheimer youth recipient named Abigail Bollenbach from the Bartlesville Astronomical Society who still is an astronomy influencer. No one from Sugar Creek Astronomical Society was present, so the Regional Representative sent it to Past President Kent Marts, who gave it to the current President, Molly Ussery, at their July meeting.

MSRAL's DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS

Another Regional grouping of awards were given to those who had spent many years volunteering in the Mid-States or at the National level or both.

Currently, the only service award MSRAL offers is the Amateur of the Year Award started in the early 50s. In light of the 75th celebration, and based on review of countless archives of National, MSRAL, and various regional club minutes, there were a few names that seemed to be in the limelight for over 30 years.

With a gap in MSRAL minutes from 1975 to 1992,

the first recipient stepped in as a regional chair in 1994 to 1996, became Regional Vice Chair in 1999, Regional Chair in 2000 and Convention Chair in 2005, all the while serving as an executive officer either Vice President or President of the Astronomical League.

A Lifetime MSRAL Service Award and Certificate of Appreciation went to Past President Carroll Iorg.



LET'S HEAR IT FOR THE GIRLS!

The second Lifetime MSRAL Service Award and Certificate of Appreciation went to a longstanding member of the Astronomical Society of Kansas City. Starting in the 1990s, Jackie Beucher served as National Executive Secretary for several years, served as President of ASKC several times, became

Regional Chair in 1992, and then served as MSRAL's Secretary-Treasurer for 7 years, stepping down in 2019.

The main project that she worked on in the 90s of which the Astronomical League is still a beneficiary was receiving all the data and information of the clubs and individual members from former Executive Secretary Janet Stevens. All memberships were entered into the MS Access Data Base software, which was the genesis of the current files used by Mitch Glaze today. Along with a few others, this team received the League's Service Award for all their hard work. Great Woman, Great Legacy.



OUR UNSUNG HEREOS—BEHIND THE SCENES

There are three other well-deserving people who are more behind the scenes, and they too are members of the Region's largest astronomy club, the Astronomical Society of Kansas City. The first recipient was the previous manager of the League store for many years. During that time, Denise Moser, set up this vital facet of the Astronomical League with products and merchandise. She was recently appointed as the League Historian and has started to organize documents, files, all the many archives, including Regional archives and documentation, at the League headquarters in Kansas City.

The second recipient is a faithful worker as well and works the store merchandise tables at ALCONS and maintains member-at-large membership records, hard files, etc. He has been working for 10 years, so congratulations to Mike Stoakes. Mike's fellow coworker who has demonstrated the same work ethic on-site for the past five years is none other than Judith Riley. Their selfless dedication may often impact their personal time, but they take what they do very seriously and it shows.

They indeed are the unsung heroes of the National Office. Since Mike and Judith were preparing store merchandise and booth equipment for Bryce Canyon, they were not able to have time to attend the MSRAL Convention in Little Rock, AR.

At the banquet, Carroll Iorg received all their certificates with new MSRAL logo pins and totes and delivered them

on behalf of the MSRAL Region.

MORE REASONS MSRAL HAS BEEN SUCCESSFUL FOR 75 YEARS PLUS



Scott Kranz, AL Awards Coordinator, from the Astronomical Society of Kansas City, was awarded for his management of the Master Imaging, Comet, Meteor, Messier and Sun Spotter Observing Programs.



Steve Boerner, Member-At-Large, is being given an award for managing the Astronomy Before the Telescope, Spectroscopy and Radio Astronomy programs for the AL.



Dan Crowson, AL coordinator from the Astronomical Society of Eastern MO, handles the Foundations of Imaging Program. The Omaha Astronomical Society received an award for the genesis of the observing programs by creating the Messier Observing Program for their 45 students back in 1963.

The first AL coordinator, Brad Young from the Astronomy Club of Tulsa, who manages Alternate Constellations, Solar Eclipse and Earth Orbiting Satellites, was honored with an award. He was not present, so his will be delivered to him at their August club meeting.
